Did you know:

Halloween is in fact a Christian festival which celebrates all the departed saints and religious martyrs throughout the world. The term Halloween is a corruption of All Hallows Eve, which is a vigil on the evening preceding All Hallows Day (All Saints Day) on 1st November each year. The following day, 2nd November, is All Souls Day which celebrates all souls departed. Given the disruption to practice that all the above factors have caused, it is essential that all choristers make their utmost efforts to attend all practices between now and Christmas.





Having just returned from an unique 34-day cruise of the North Atlantic, Martin Jones provided a travelogue of the trip and I thought I'd share some of his observations with you would-be intrepid cruisers who may be tempted to do the same.

The no-fly cruise embarked from Tilbury, sailing via the Shetlands to the Faroe Islands and then 4 days sailing to Greenland, viewing spectacular wildlife on the way including Icelandic Eagles, Tufted Plover and virtually every species of whale, except the massive Right Whale. Interestingly, the cruise ship follows a protocol that limits its speed to 8 knots, a rate slower than most whales swim, in order to avoid endangering the mammals. The voyage from Greenland to Newfoundland encountered icebergs, whales, porpoise, dolphins and the occasionally albatross. The sailing onwards to Nova Scotia and the St Lawrence Seaway was interrupted by Storm Fiona and the remnants of Hurricane Ian (no relation!) but offered Martin and Kim the opportunity to indulge their passion for sea shanty and folk singing.

I'm not sure whether this will inspire or discourage potential cruise-lovers, but the good news is that Martin has returned safely to these shores, suitably weather-beaten and bearded and is reported to have rejected lucrative offers to become the new poster boy for frozen fish fingers!

Raiders of the Lost Archive

Following last month's report that this magnificent wooden wine cask has been rediscovered, John Counsell tells me that it was presented to PMC by MGV Buchenau on 11 Sept 2004 as part of the PMC centenary celebrations. MGV Buchenau are a male choir from a suburb of Bruchsal, Cwmbran's twin town.

John further explains that MGV = Manner Gesang Verein = Male Singing Society i.e Buchenau Male Choir and that members were his guests during their visit. He remembers the party so well and is not surprised the barrel is empty!!!

So there we have it – an admission of complicity and guilt! Does anyone else want to purge their conscience with their recollections?



More from the archive

Following much rummaging in his drawers by Phil Evans, a copy of 'Pontnewydd Male Choir – A History 1904 – 1979' has come into my possession and after some scrutiny a particular paragraph stood out. It related to the Welfare Hall (now demolished) but which was the regular practice venue for the choir for many years up until 1957. It is described as "draughty, ill-lit with heating that left much to be desired. Two large stoves augmented a primitive central heating system. Coupled with a crude cardboard screen, a life-sustaining temperature was achieved in winter, but often, when the wind blew the wrong way, an imminent grand climax to a chorus evaporated in a paroxysm of coughing as a pall of smoke enveloped the choir."

I don't think we'd put up with those conditions now, but perhaps our predecessors were made of sterner stuff. It makes you appreciate our current practice room!

Choir repertoire

Our MD, **Sarah Jones**, explains that, since the return to full practice following the Covid lockdown, her priorities for the choir have been:

- To get us all back singing as quickly as possible by focussing on those pieces that had formed our core repertoire pre-Covid
- To include additional pieces that will be sung at the Massed Choir event in St David's Hall next year
- To add a small number of easy-to-learn songs, such as Autumn Leaves, that broaden our repertoire

Hedgehogs Tip No 2

Put Out Food and Water

This time of year hedgehogs are bulking up in readiness for hibernation. You can put out food and water to encourage hedgehogs to your garden and supplement their natural diet. Any meaty dog or cat food is loved by hedgehogs; however I prefer to use meat-flavoured cat or kitten biscuits as they don't attract flies, and also the crunching helps keep their teeth healthy.
